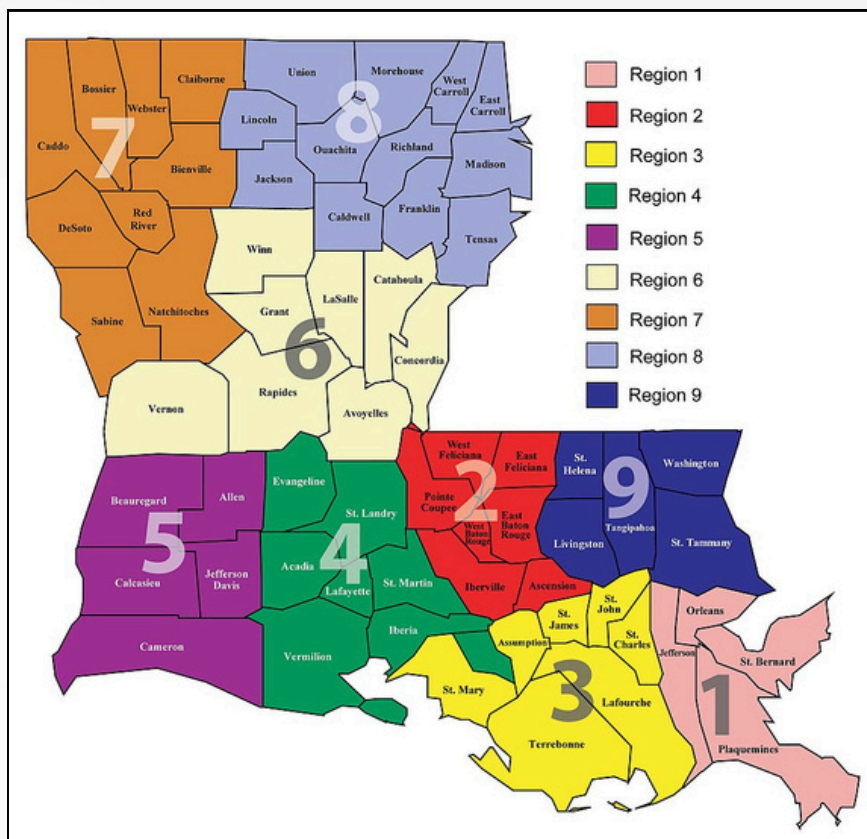

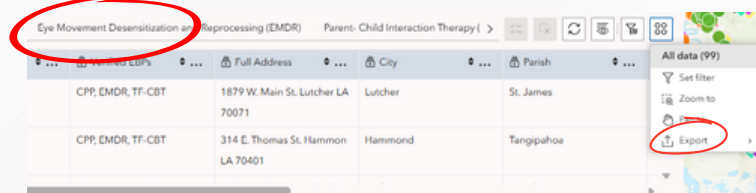
EBP AGENCY & PROVIDER MAP PROGRESS: 6 MONTHS IN REVIEW

From January to June 2026, the Center completed extensive email and phone call follow up for all the providers and agencies that were listed on the EBP map. This effort has led to a more accurate representation of EBP agencies throughout Louisiana. Revisions to the map include the addition of 18 provider agencies in the past six months and small losses in formerly identified EMDR, TF-CBT, CPP and PPT providers. A snapshot of the revised map is shown below with a breakdown of the 18 newly added providers.

Simultaneously, various features were added to the map to enable the map experience to be more user-friendly. A table visual of data alongside the map is now accessible, a 'search' bar feature to further refine map inquiries, a 'turn on' and 'turn off' feature on the map when selecting EBPs, as well as the option to 'export' map data to allow users access the data in their preferred method.

Over the next six months, our goal is to maintain the accuracy of map data by continuing our monthly check of EBP submission form responses and adding that information to our new enhanced map.

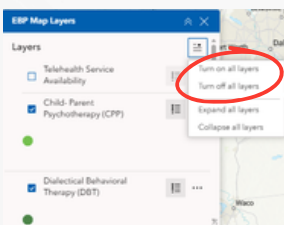

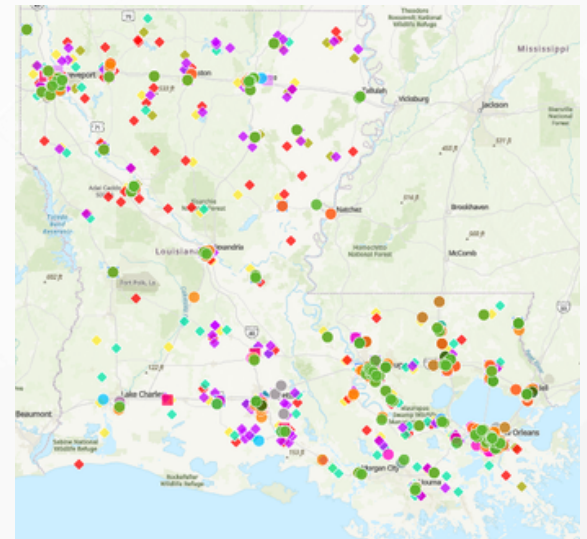

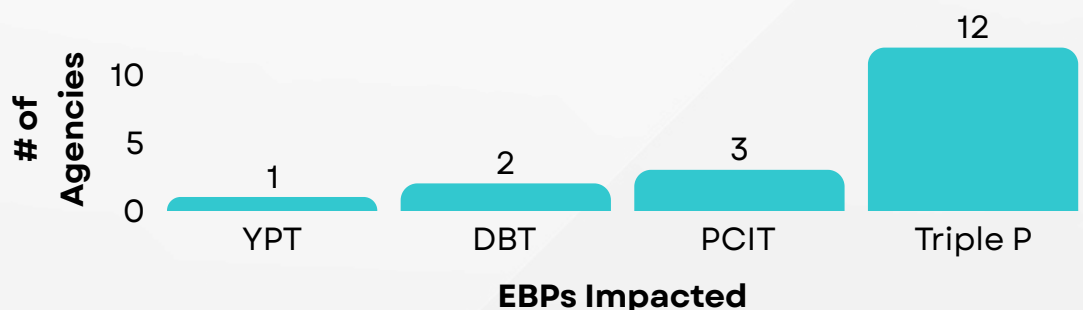

2026 TRAINING CENTER IMPACT

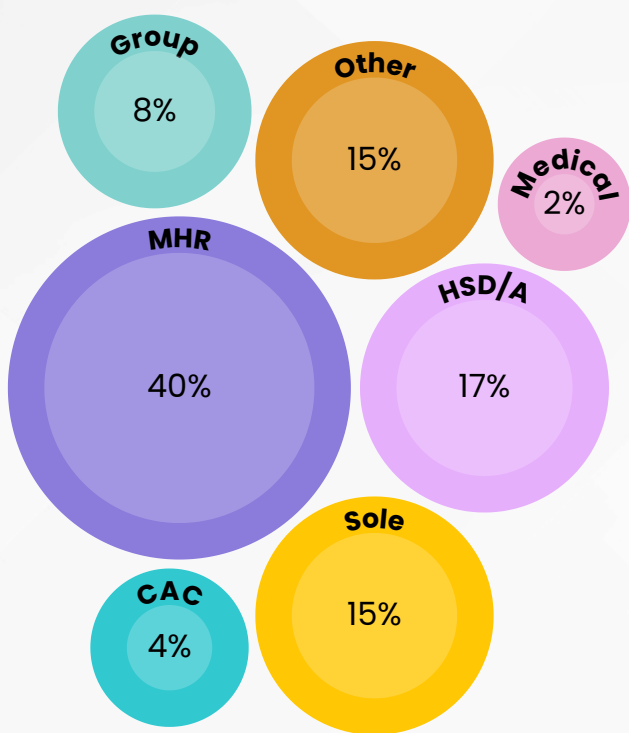

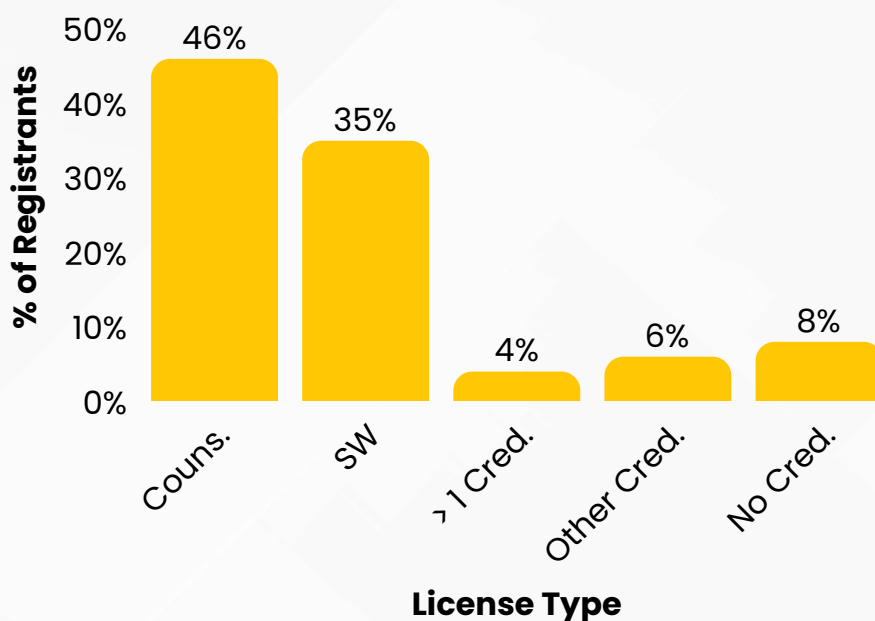

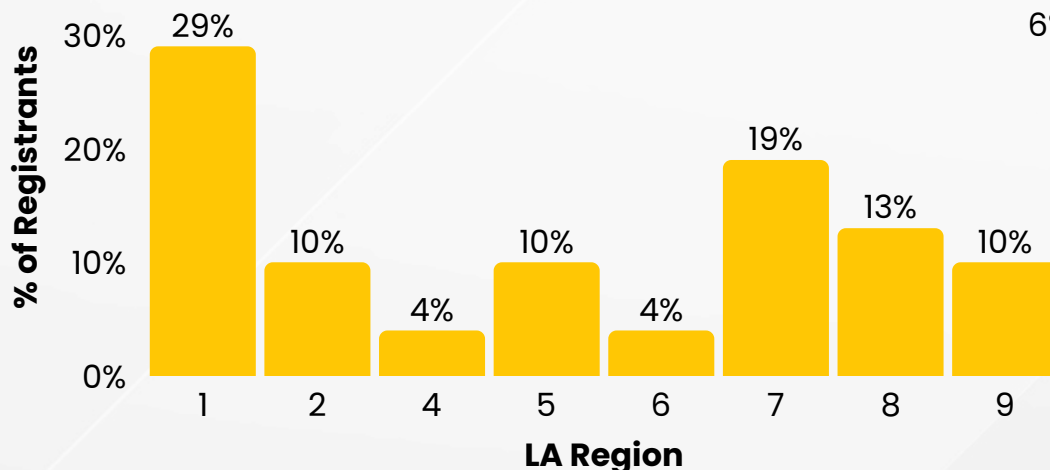

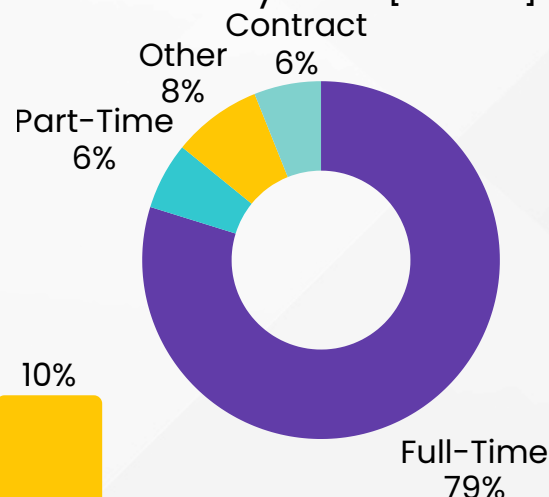

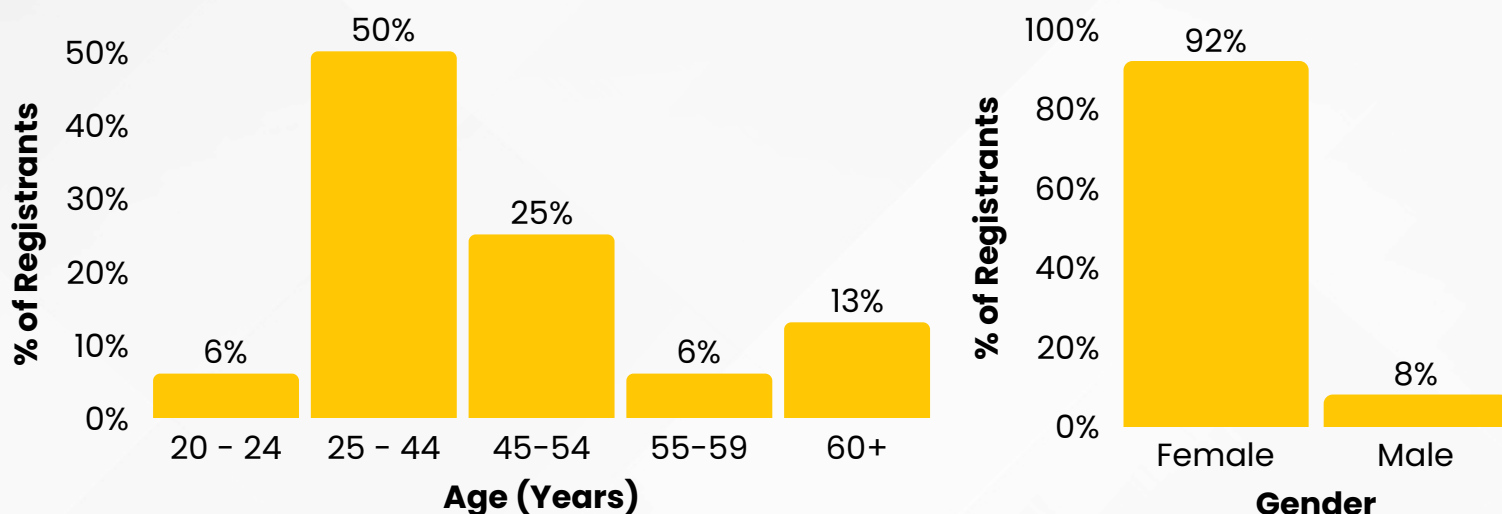

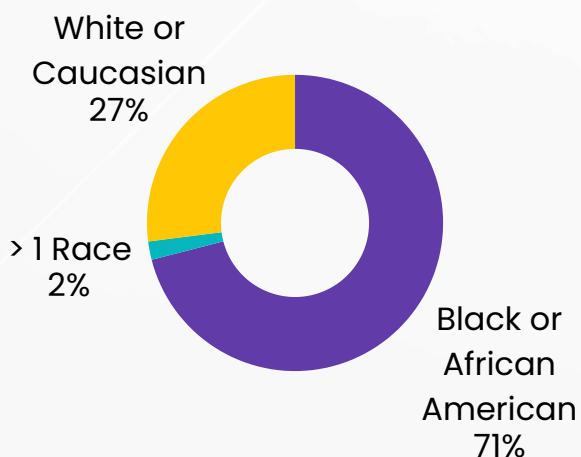
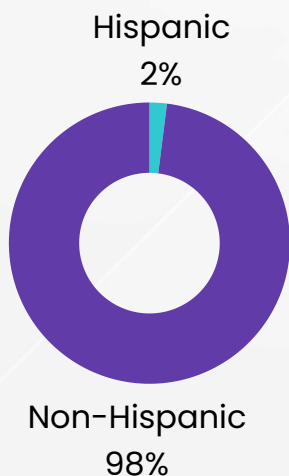


Registrant Data by Race

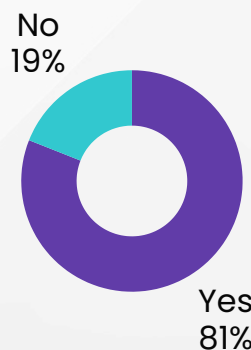
Registrant Data by Ethnicity

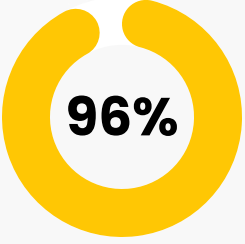

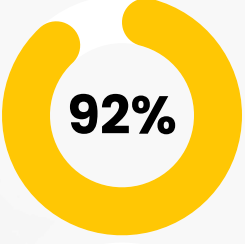

EBP TRAINING: AT-A-GLANCE

Below is an overview of the **eight (8) EBP training cohorts** which the Center offered during the **past six months**. Each of these **EBP cohorts** is either a **continuation of a training that started before the 2026 calendar year**, or a **new cohort which began training in the 2026 calendar year**. This distinction is identified below.

DBT

CONTINUATION: **DBT** is a comprehensive, multi-diagnostic, behavioral intervention designed to treat both adults and children/adolescents with severe mental disorders and out-of-control cognitive, emotional, and behavior patterns, including suicidal and/or self-harming behaviors.

TF-CBT

CONTINUATION: **TF-CBT** is a therapy to help traumatized youth manage their thoughts and feelings related to their trauma experience, change inaccurate/unhelpful thoughts, build skills to relax/control emotions, and improve safety. Gradual exposure is used to desensitize the youth to traumatic memories and trauma reminders.

PPT/YPT

NEW COHORT: **PPT** is a therapy to treat very young children and **YPT** is a therapy to treat youth with PTSD and trauma-related symptoms.

Triple P

NEW COHORT: **Triple P** is a parenting and family support system designed to prevent and treat behavioral and emotional dysfunction in children.

PCIT

TWO NEW COHORTS: **PCIT** is for younger children with emotional and behavioral disorders. This model places emphasis on improving the quality of the parent-child relationship and changing parent-child interaction patterns.

CPP

CONTINUATION: **CPP** examines how trauma affects the child-caregiver relationship and the child's development. A central goal is to support and strengthen the caregiver-child relationship, while restoring and protecting the child's mental health.

TGCTA

NEW COHORT: **TGCTA** is geared towards treating adolescents between 12 to 18 years of age who have been exposed to trauma, bereavement, traumatic bereavement, and other adverse childhood experiences which may place them at high risk for severe persisting distress, functional impairment, risky behavior, and developmental disruption.

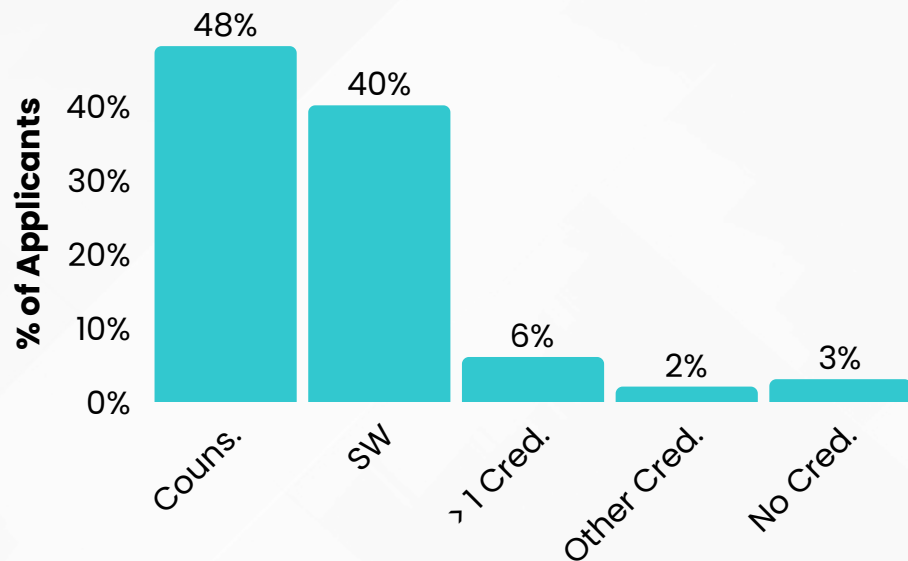

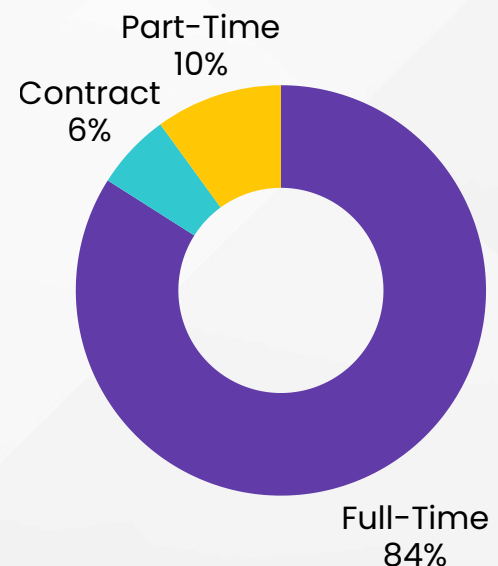

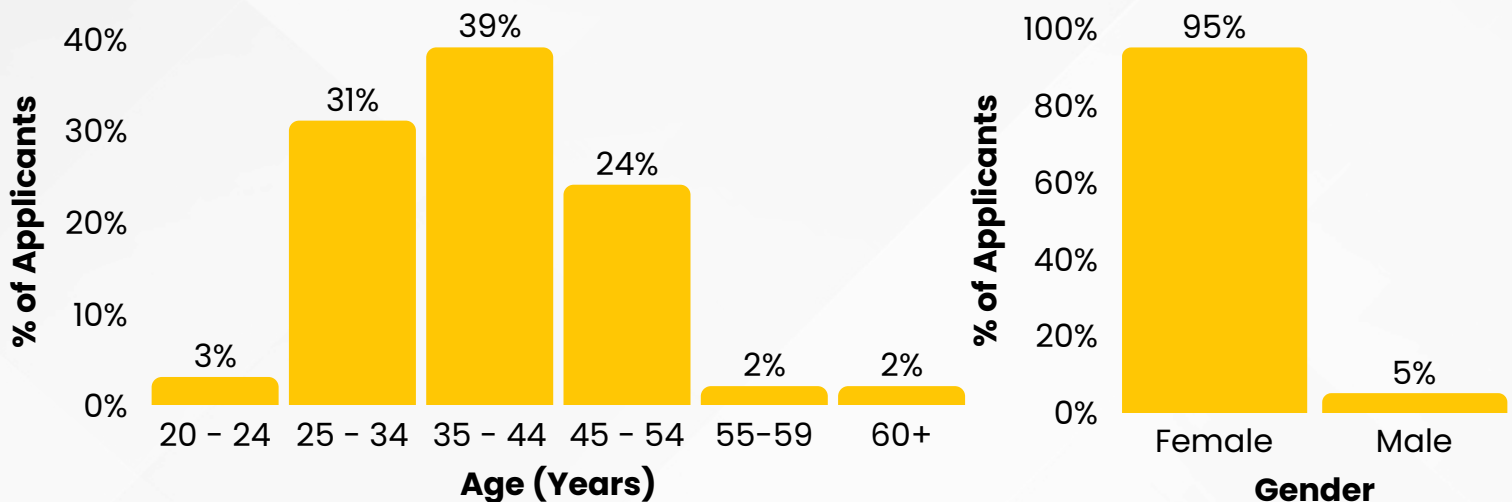

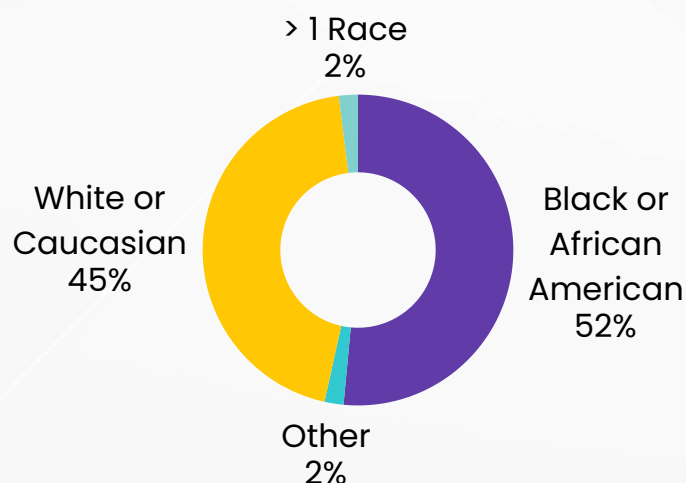
Applicant Data by Age & Gender

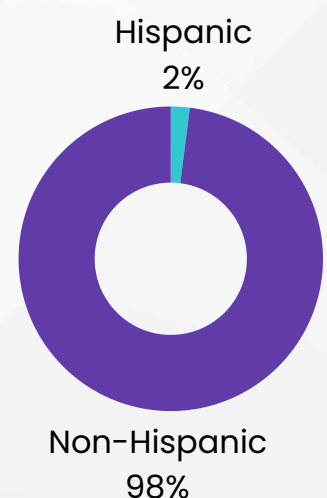
Applicant Data by Race

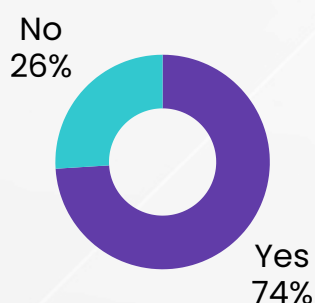
Applicant Data by Ethnicity

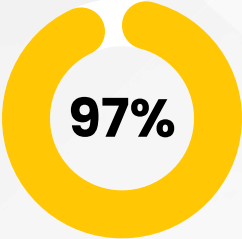

ADV. EBP TRAINING: AT-A-GLANCE

Below is an overview of the **seven (7) Advanced EBP trainings** which the Center offered during the **past six months**. Each of these trainings **built upon concepts established in previous EBP trainings**. Some of these **have been offered previously**, others are **new offerings starting in 2026**. The difference is noted below.

EMDR with I/DD

FIRST TIME OFFERED: The **EMDR with the I/DD Populations** training covered methods on adapting EMDR to treat clients who may have an I/DD. It focused on providing tools for clinicians to use in assessing and diagnosing I/DD clients and fostering trust and safety with soothing and grounding techniques.

TF-CBT with I/DD

FIRST TIME OFFERED: The **Adapting TF-CBT for Youth with I/DD** training was aimed at guiding TF-CBT providers on how to administer the TF-CBT model to I/DD clients while maintaining fidelity. Special attention was given to monitoring distress in clients as the trauma narrative is discussed during therapeutic sessions.

Caregiver Participation

FIRST TIME OFFERED: **Caregiver Participation: Why, When, How, and What If?** focused on increasing both the quality and quantity of caregiver participation when using TF-CBT on children and adolescents as it is proven to lead to better outcomes.

Thematic Narratives in Complex Trauma

PREVIOUSLY OFFERED: **Thematic NCT** is an advanced training aimed at assisting TF-CBT clinicians in gathering trauma narratives from clients and discussing proper use of the narratives in session and guiding treatment.

Advanced Cognitive Processing

PREVIOUSLY OFFERED: The primary goal of the **ACP** training is to instruct TF-CBT-trained clinicians in collaborating with their clients to identify thinking errors, flush out trauma these, and challenge unhelpful critical beliefs that may be overly personalized.

Triple P & Telehealth

FIRST TIME OFFERED: **Implementing Triple P via Telehealth** seeks to assist Triple P clinicians in adapting their Triple P practice to be administered via telehealth platforms while maintaining fidelity to the model.

DBT & Telehealth

FIRST TIME OFFERED: **Implementing DBT via Telehealth** seeks to assist DBT clinicians in adapting their DBT sessions, including skills groups, to be conducted via telehealth platforms while maintaining fidelity to the model.

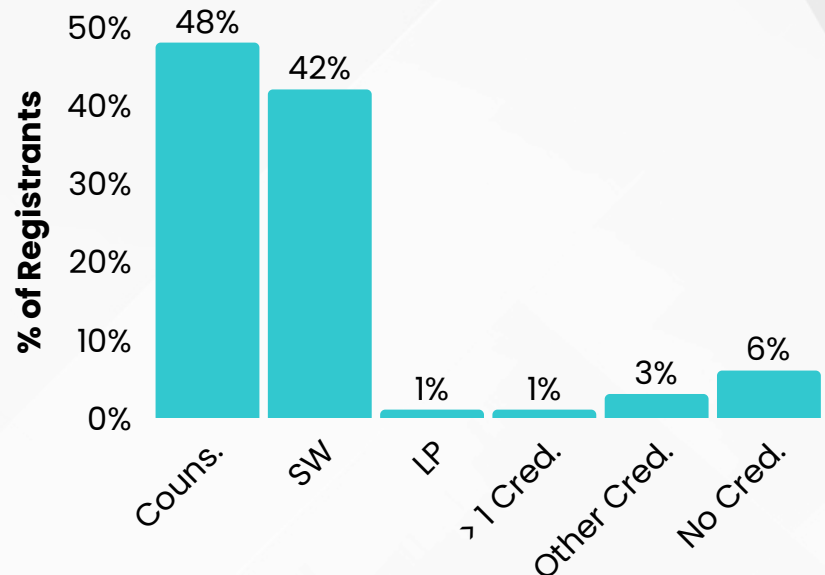

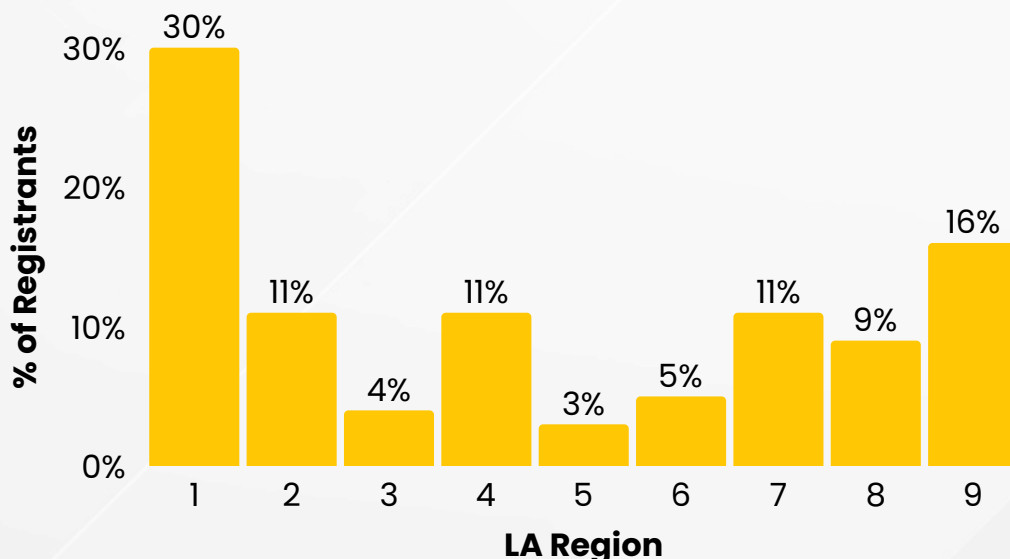

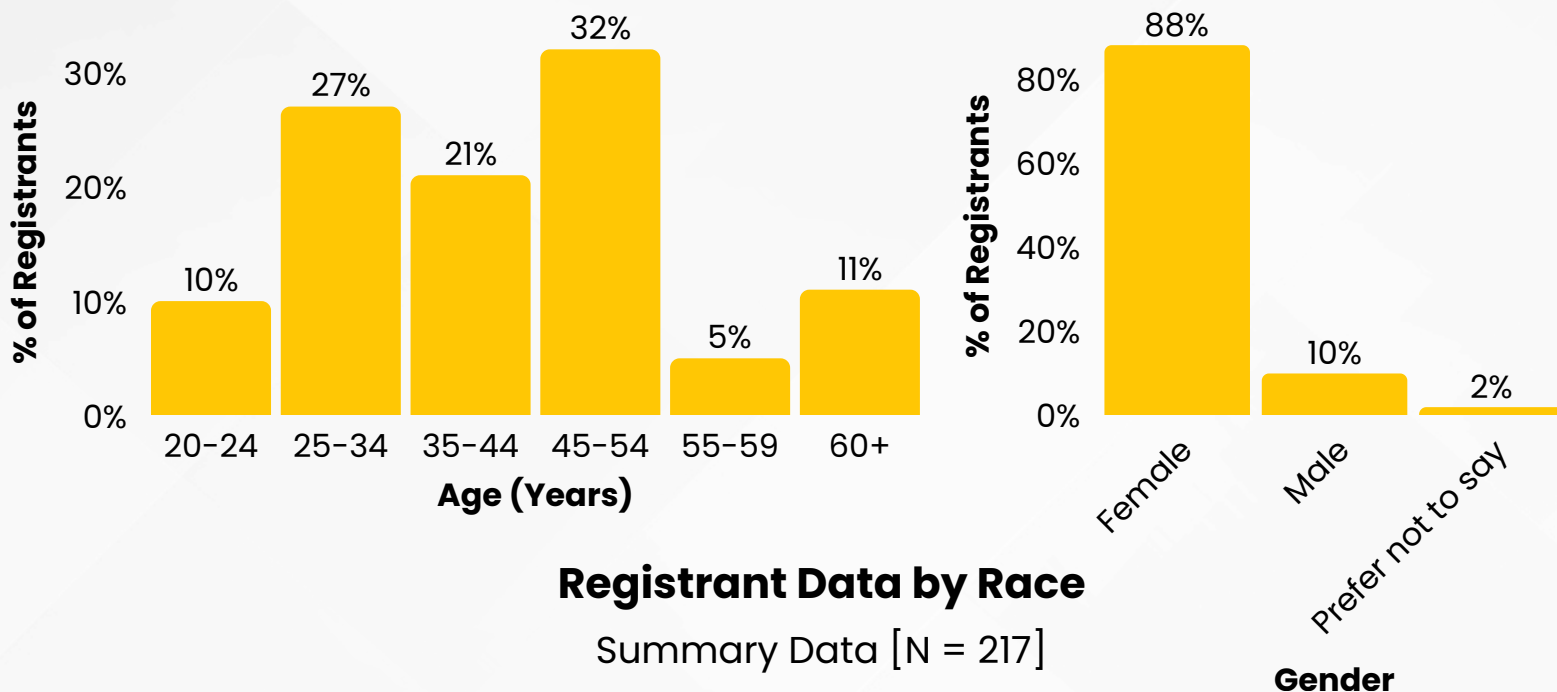

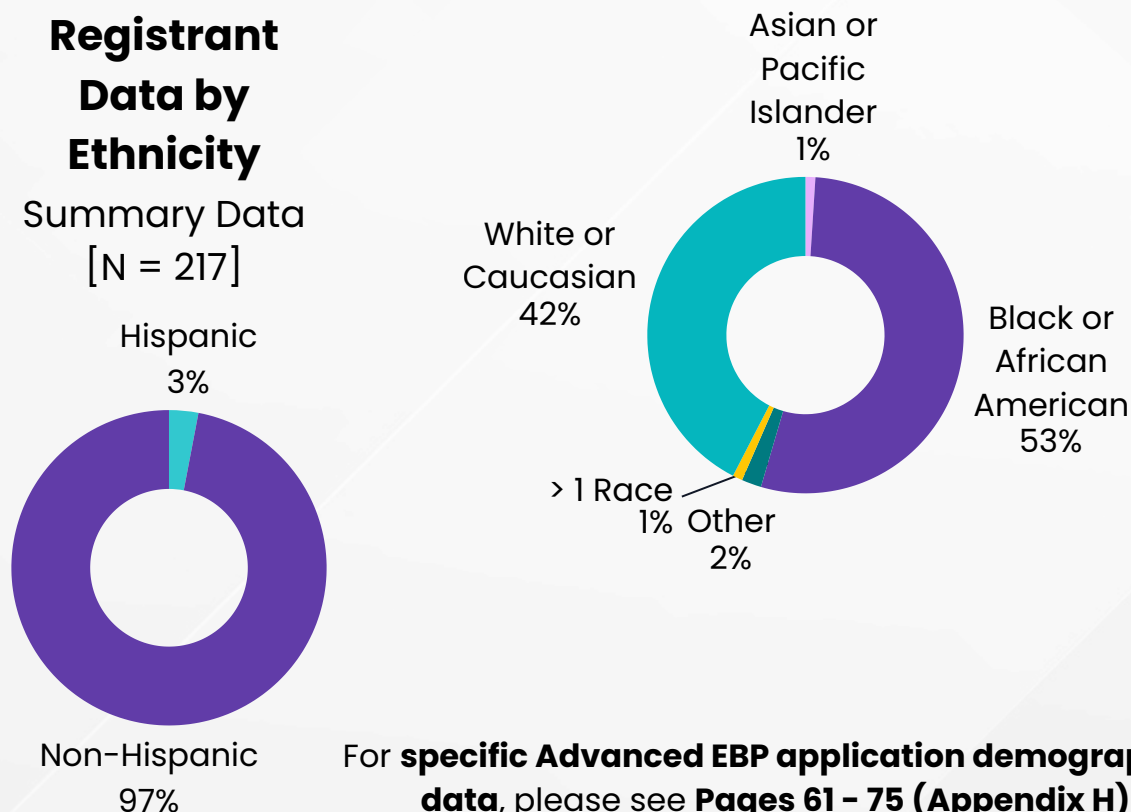
Registrant Data by Age & Gender

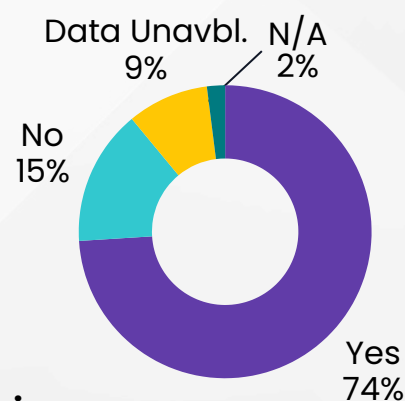
Registrant Data by Race

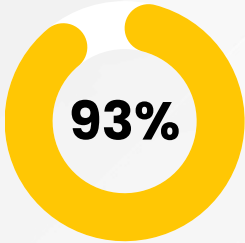

ADVANCED EBP TRAINING: EVALUATION FEEDBACK

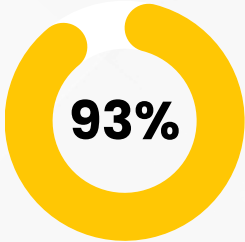

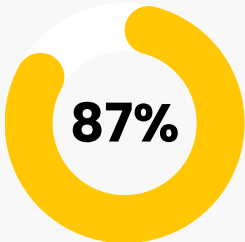

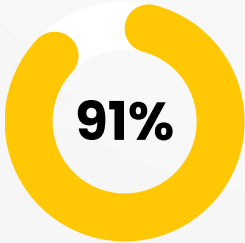

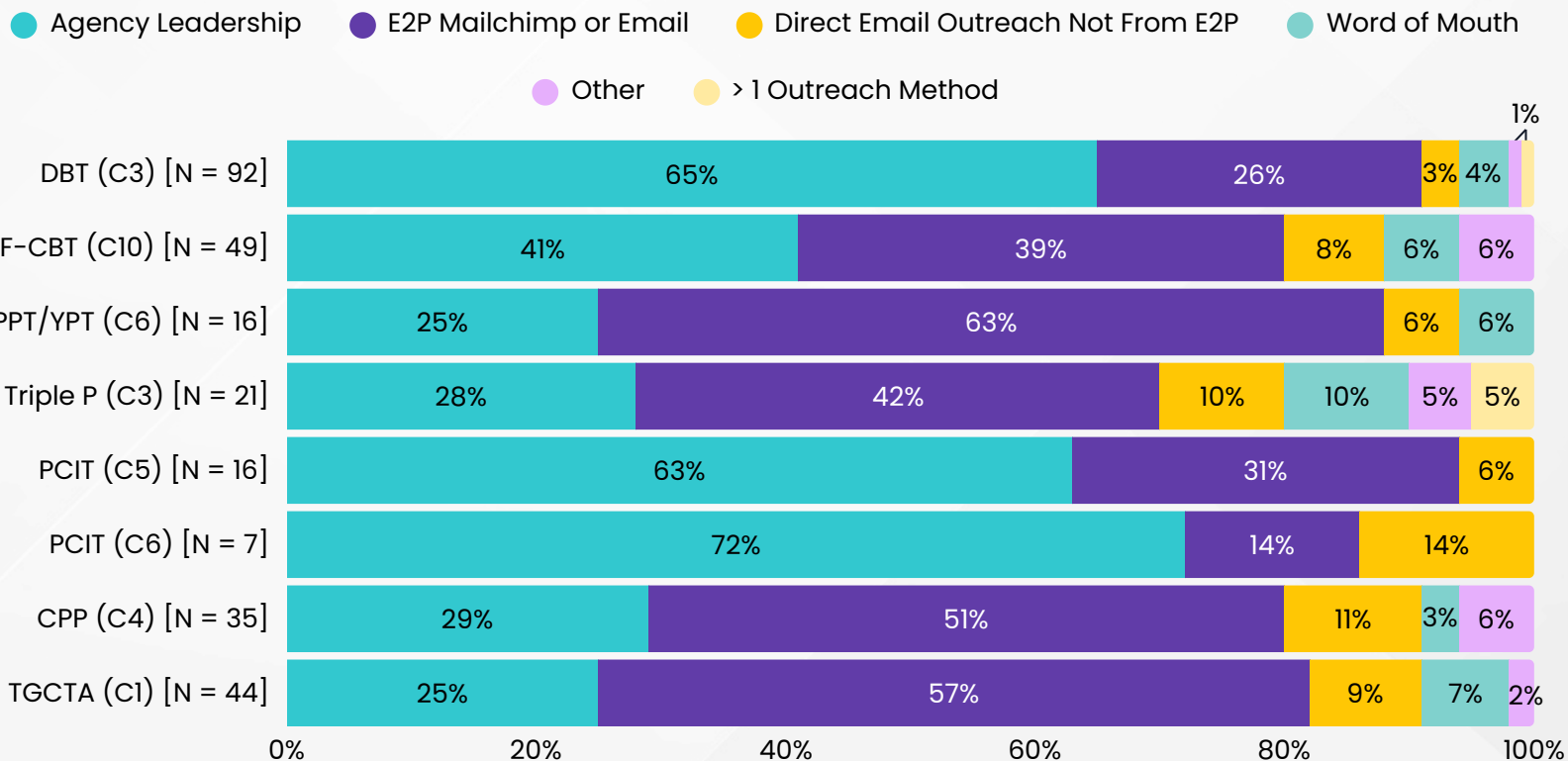
METHODS OF EBP OUTREACH

During each training **application cycle**, data was captured on **how applicants learned about the given EBP training opportunity**. *Note: the **abbreviations next to each EBP** (e.g. "C8") refers to the **cohort number** of that particular model.*

Although it varies by EBP, the **most effective** forms of outreach were **direct outreach to agency leadership** and **E2P Mailchimp or Email**. **Agency leadership** includes **directors, supervisors, managers, and/or employers**.

Since the start of 2026, the Center has **continued strategic outreach to agencies** that may be a good fit for training; this has been found to be an **effective approach** and it will **continue throughout the rest of the year**.

In 2026, the Implementation team (aka: our EBP advisory board) met once this year in March 2026. The team is made of 27 members representing provider agencies, child/family advocates, state leadership and more. So far, this year's meeting focused on receiving feedback on enhancements to our EBP Agency Map as well as our ***NEWLY*** finalized EBP Provider Dashboard (see graphic below). We also discussed the current Medicaid landscape and the launch of two initiatives in Louisiana, Early Childhood Supports & Services (ECSS) and Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic (CCBHCs).

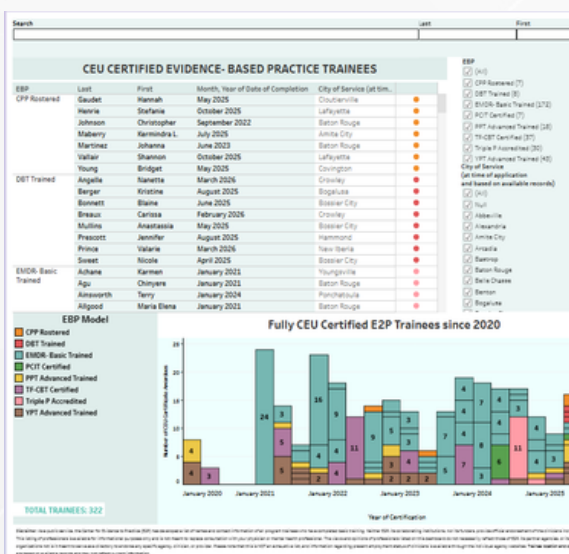
QUARTERLY MCO MEETING



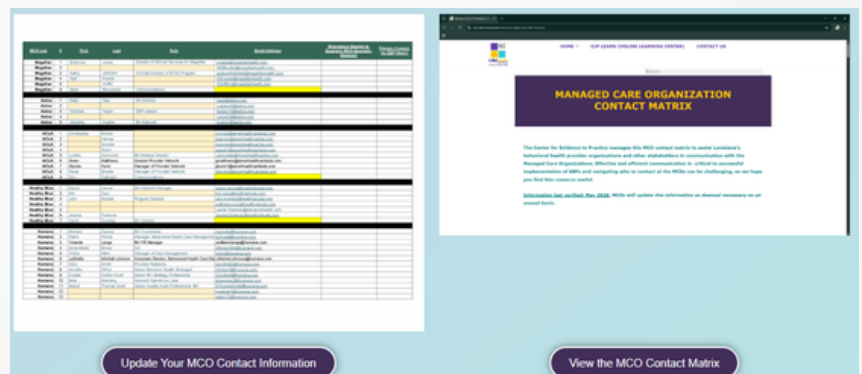
The Center meets with each of the six Managed Care Organizations (MCOs) and the CSoc Contractors (Magellan) quarterly. Attendance in the meetings ranged from 24-29 participants.

Thus far in our meeting series, we have discussed various updates as it relates to the Center and our resources. These updates were pertaining to the MCO Webpage, which includes the updated EBP Provider Dashboard, as well as the EBP Provider Map enhancements. We have also added the updated MCO Contact Matrix for providers (see graphic below). Additionally, we have learned about the credentialing process for each MCO, and were able to share the upcoming training opportunities. Overall, it has been a productive relationship-building experience throughout the past year with the MCOs.

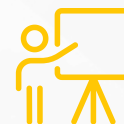

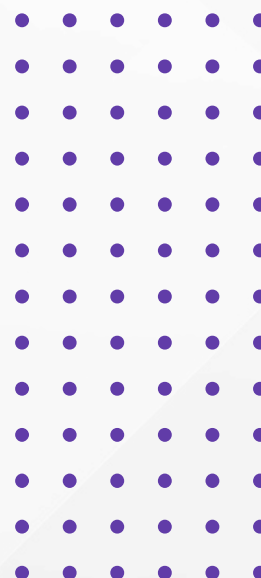

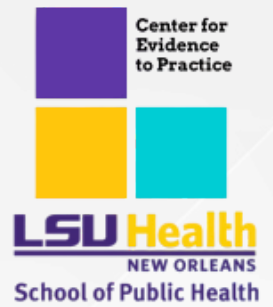
2026–2029 PROJECTED TRAINING PROGRESSION
